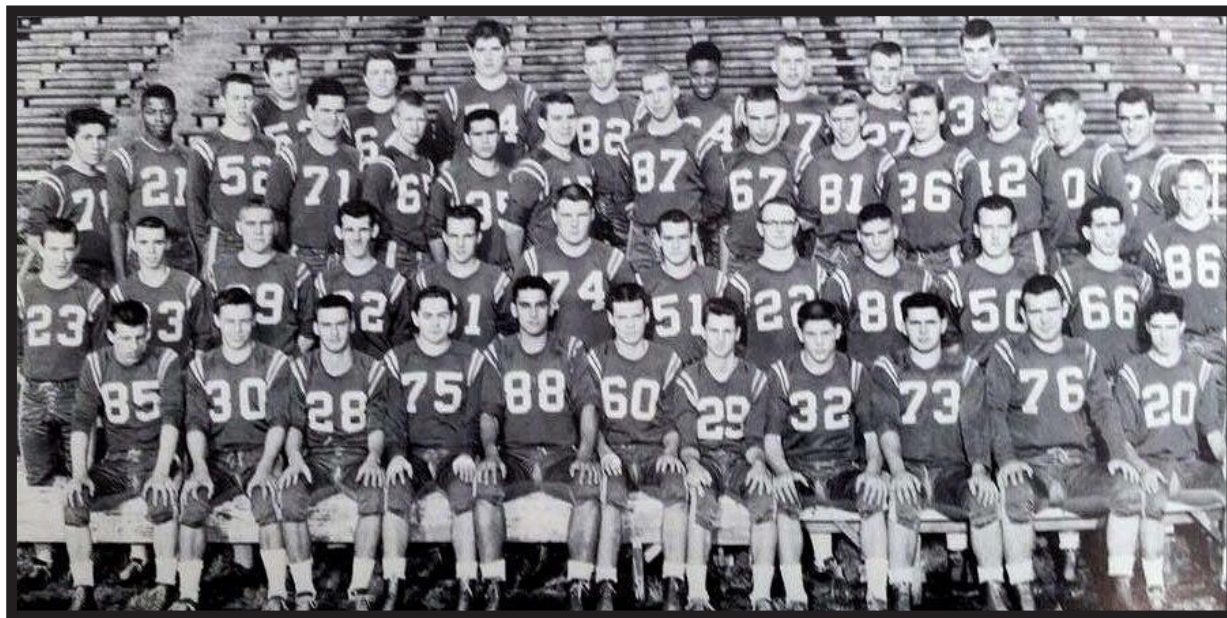


1917 First Unbeaten Football Team

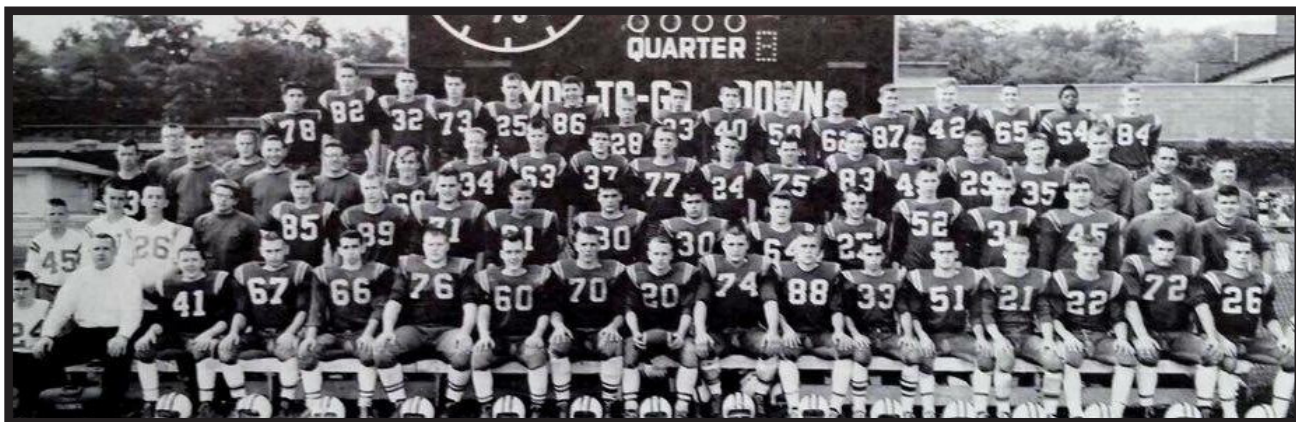

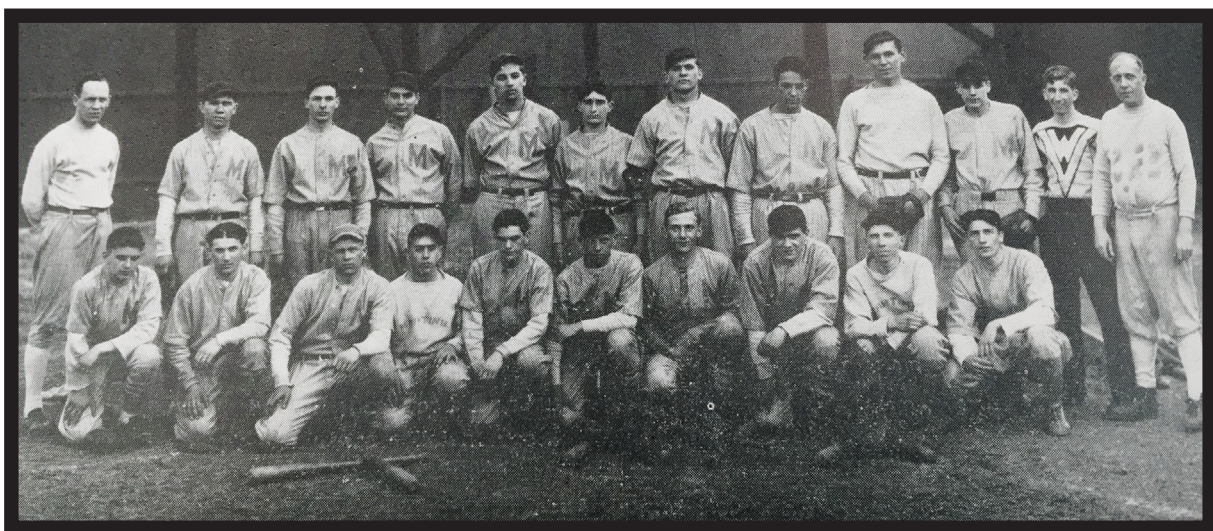


1929 Baseball Team State Qualifier

1931 Baseball Team State Qualifier



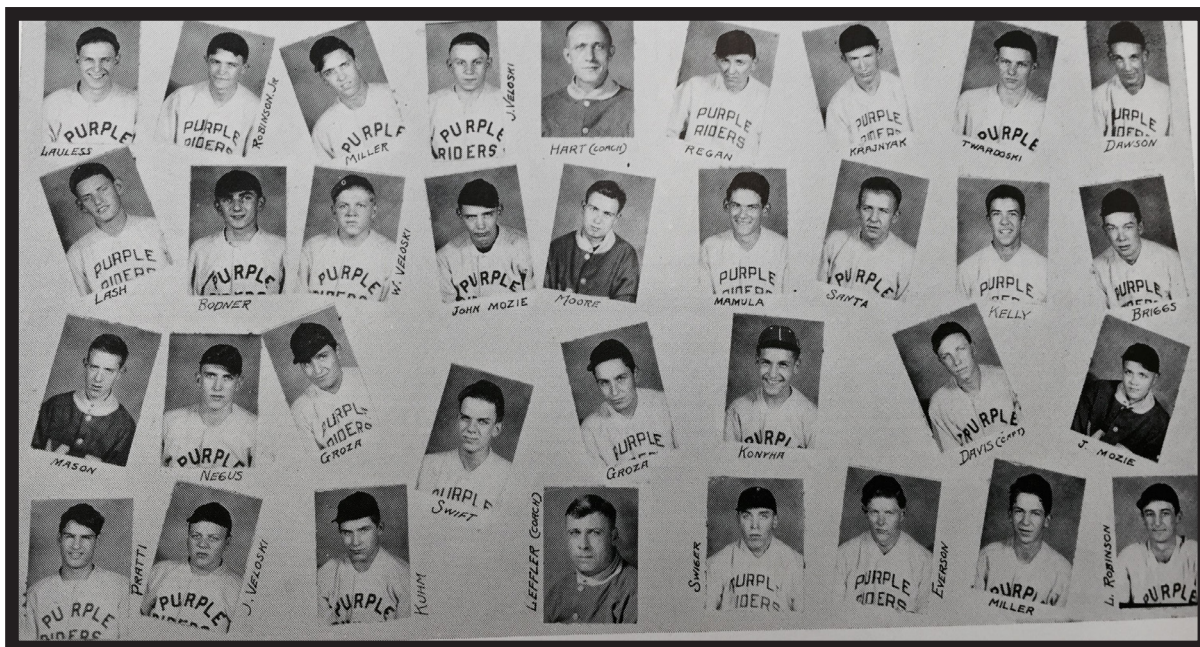

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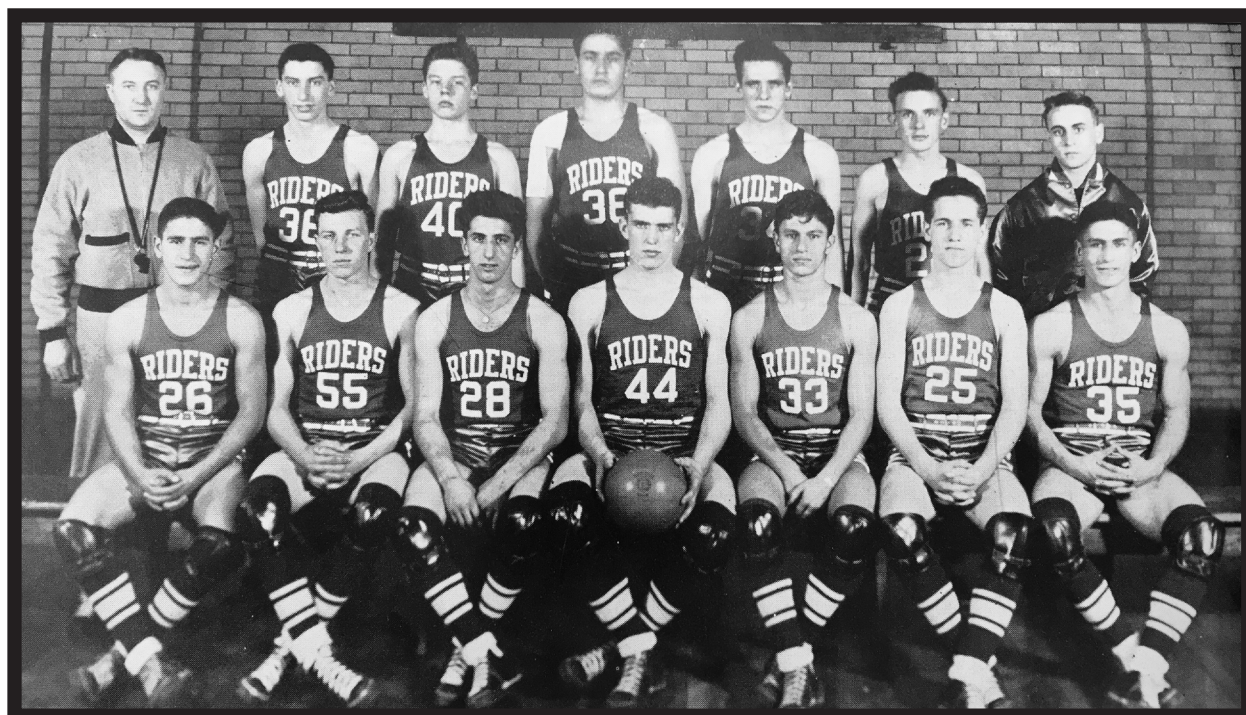


1939 Baseball Team State Qualifier

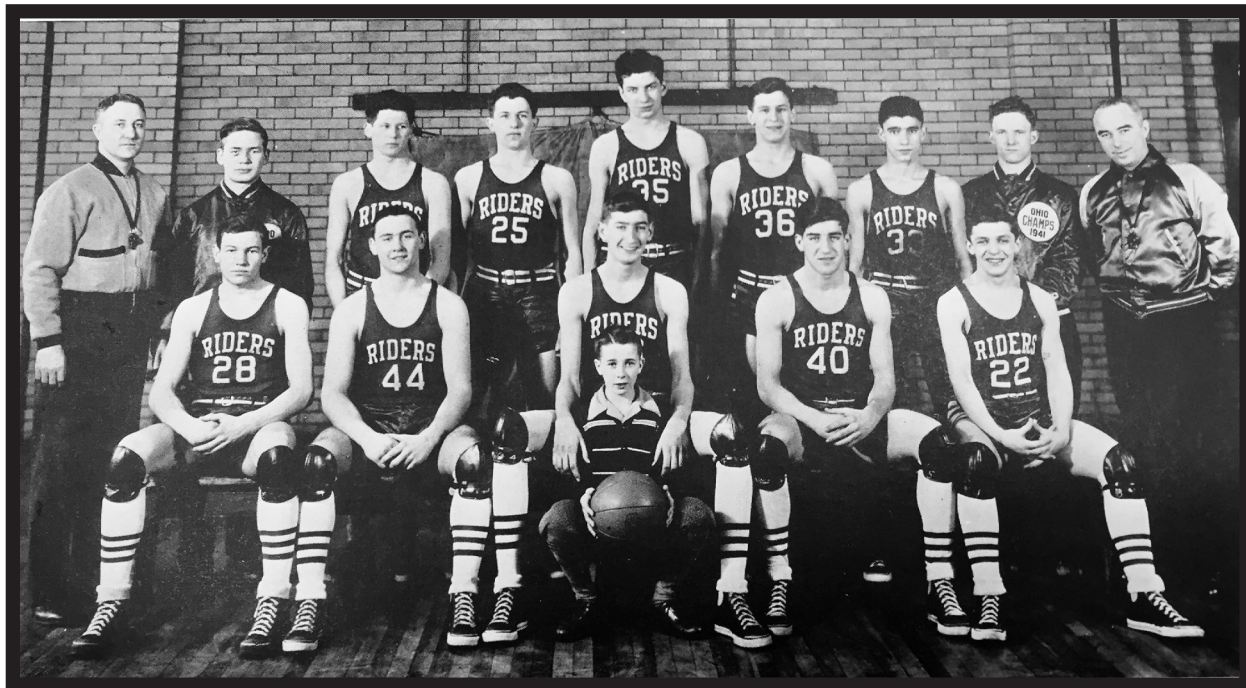

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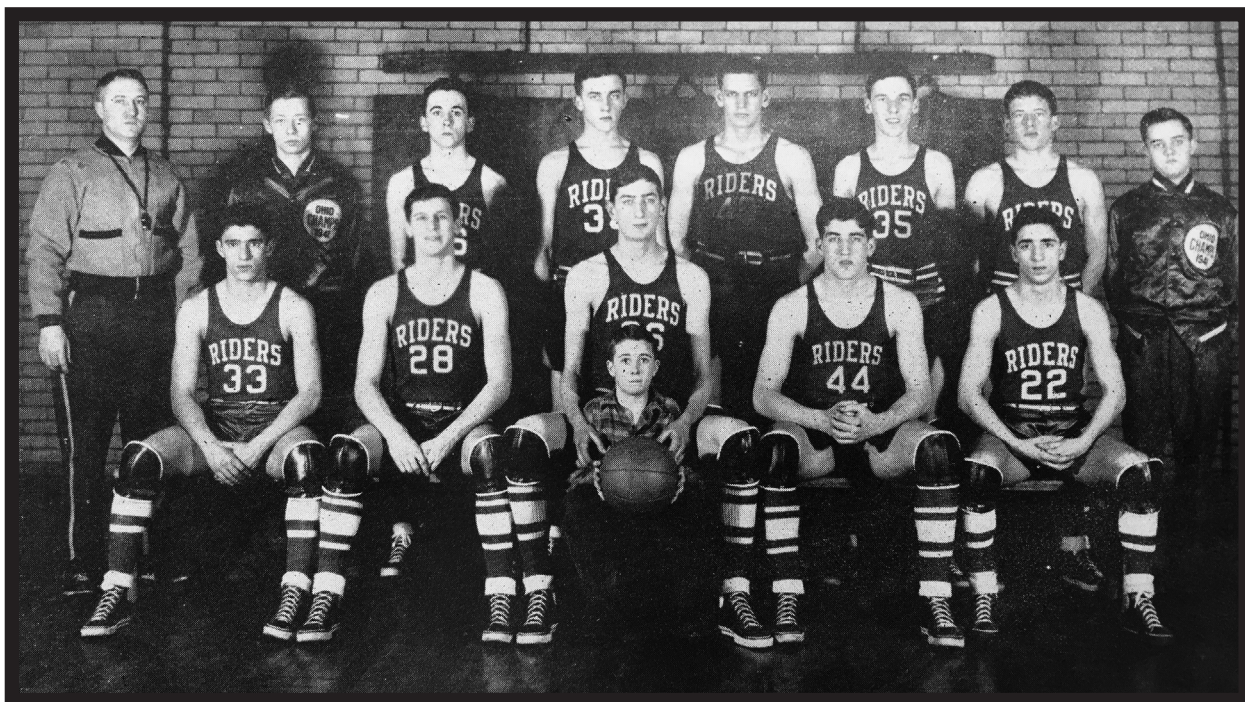


1943 Basketball Team State Qualifier

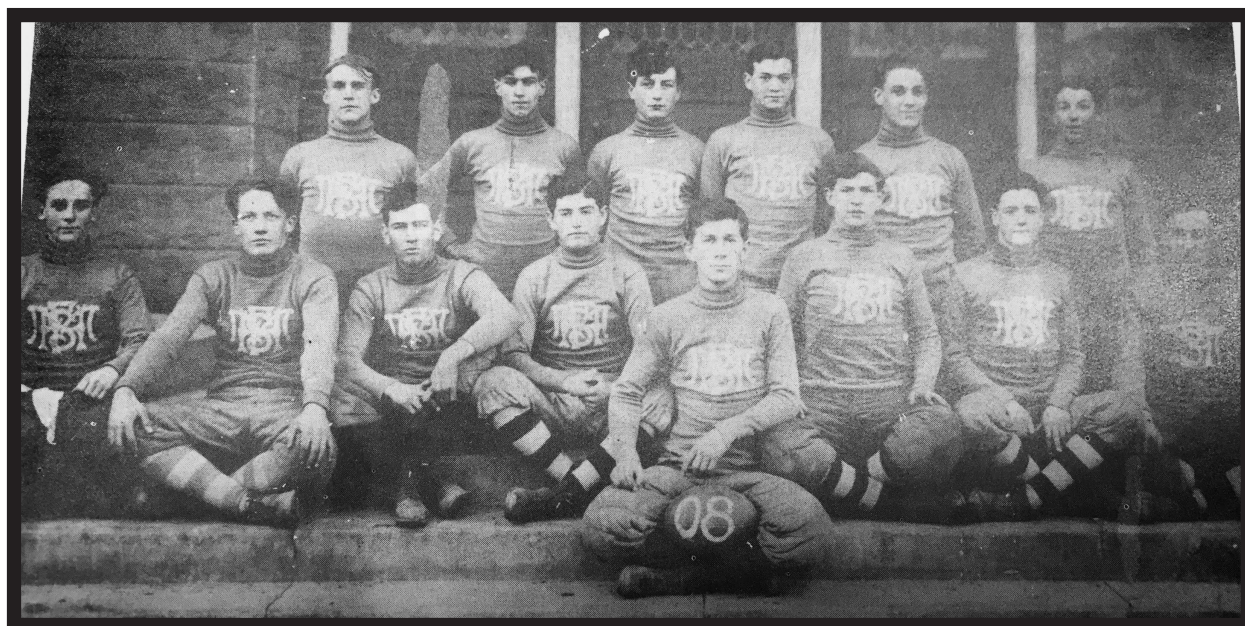


1941 Unbeaten Tennis Team

1913 Football Team



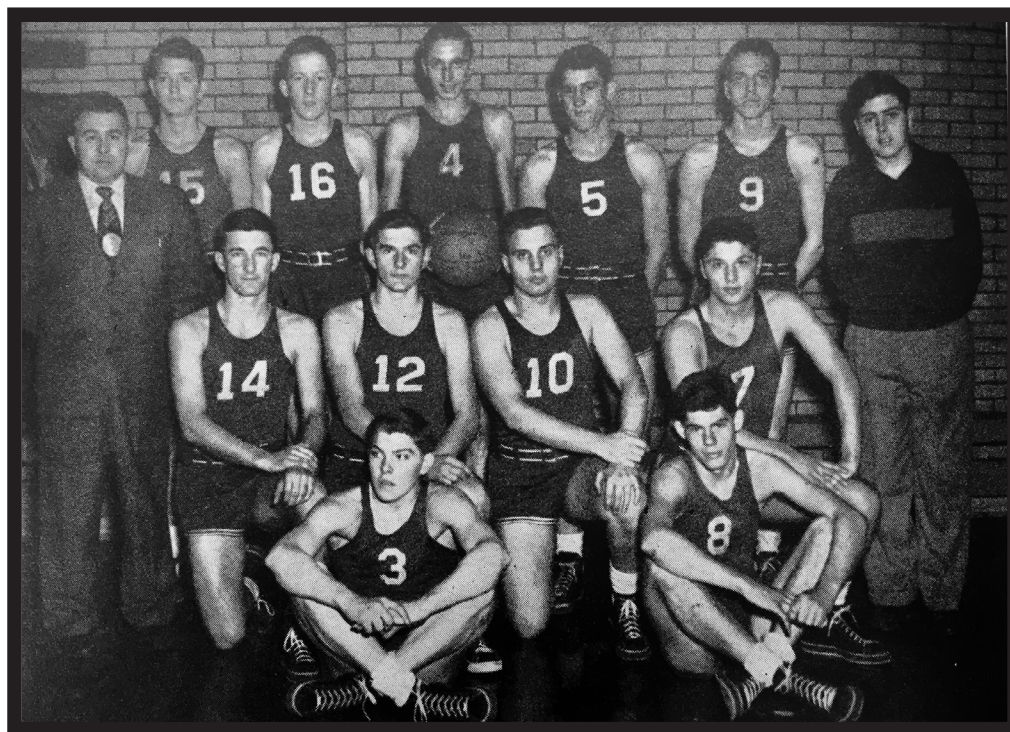

1961 OVAC/District Champion Wrestling Team



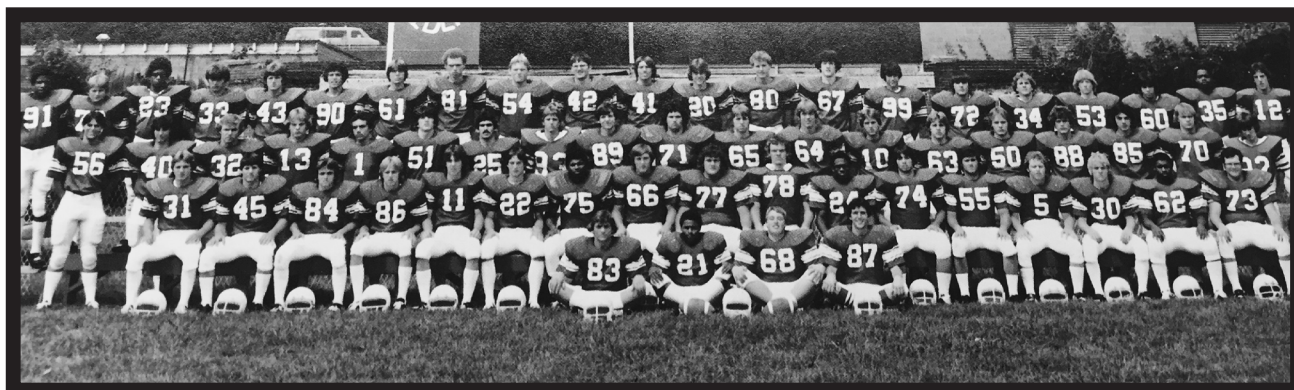

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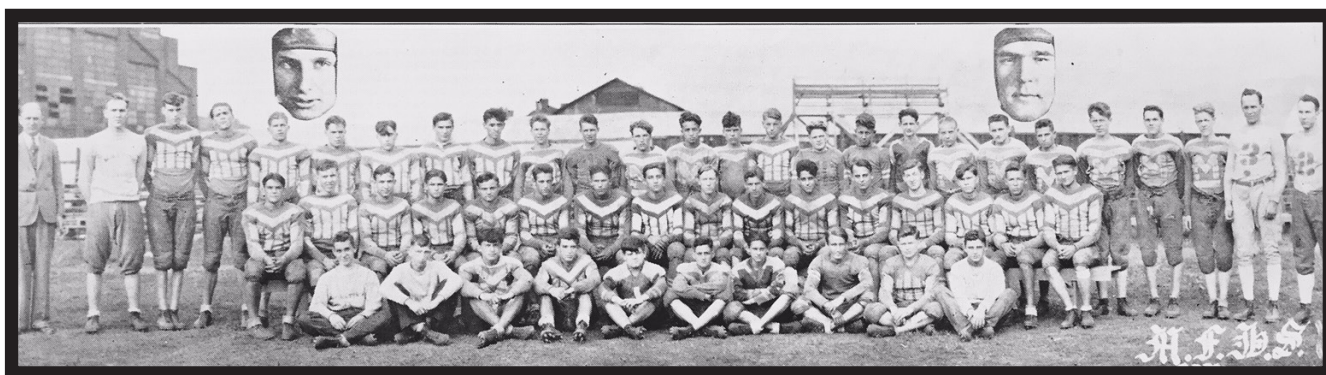


1979 Unbeaten Football Team

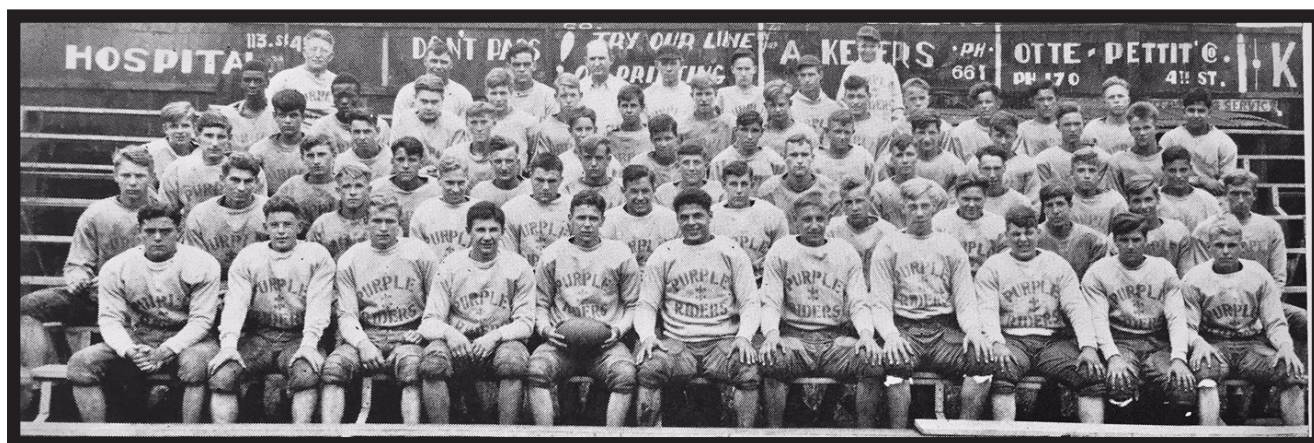

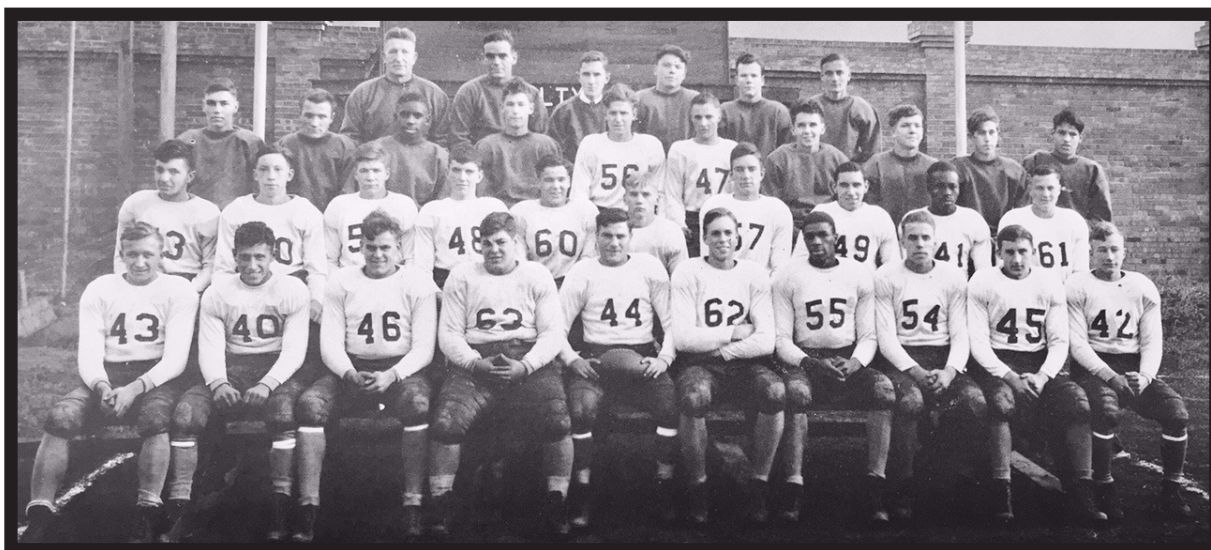


1934 Unbeaten Football Team

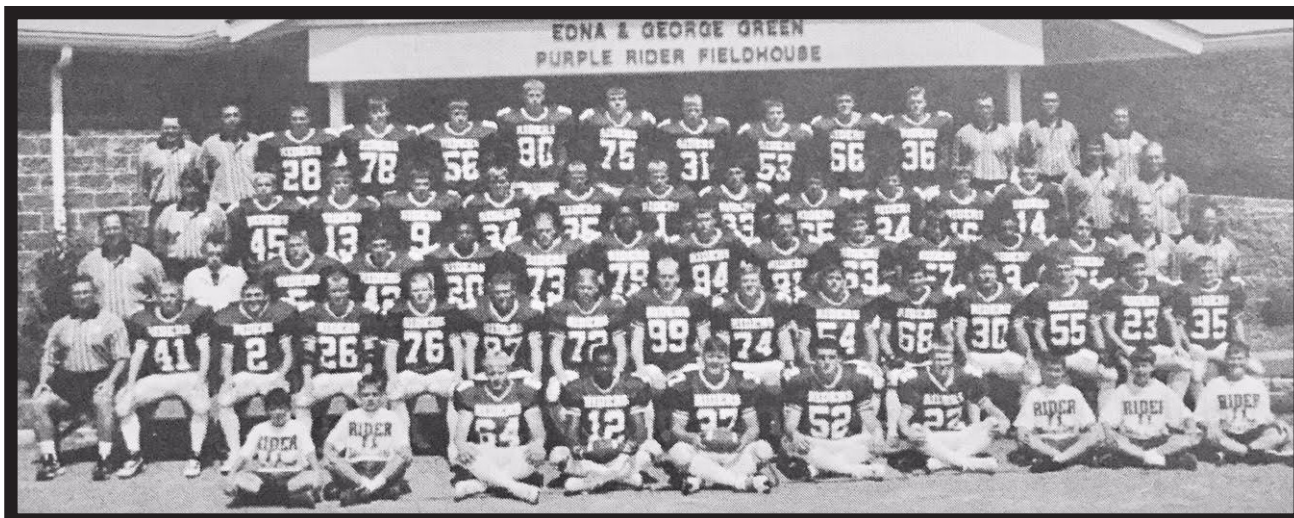
1936 Unbeaten Football Team

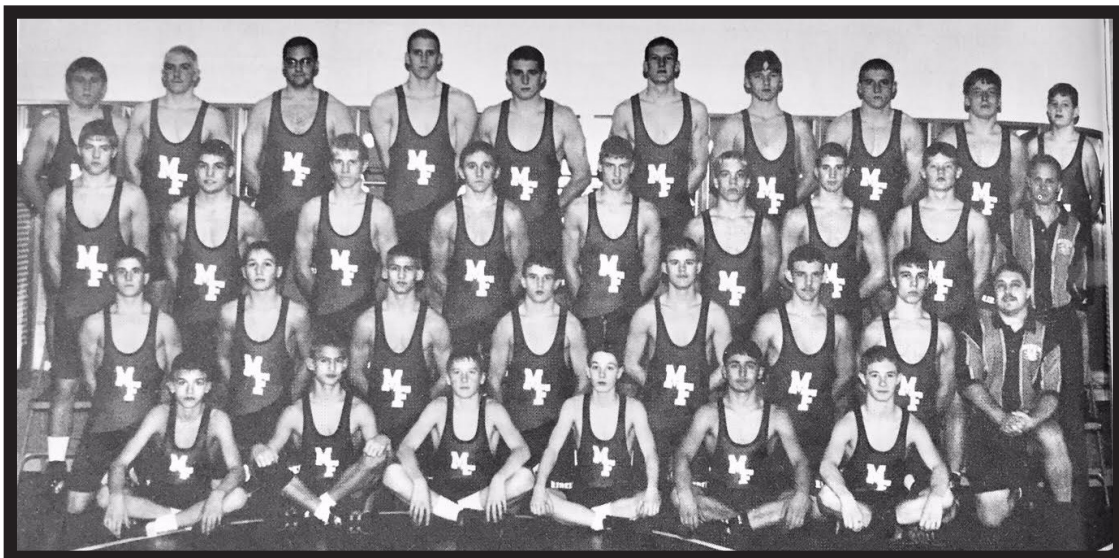

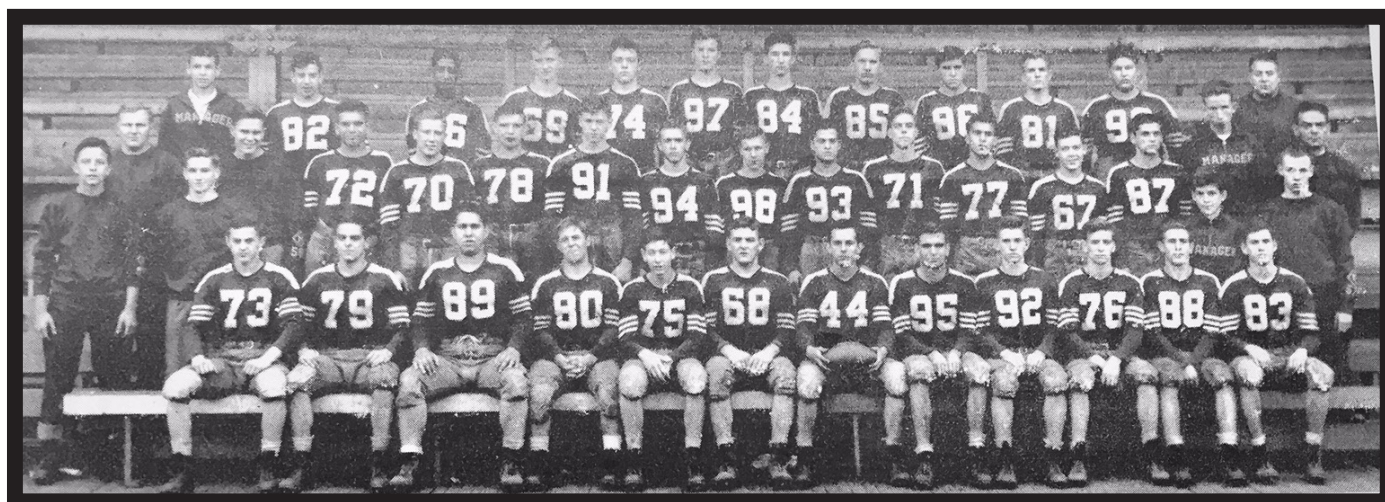
1999 Overall OVAC Champion/ 3rd in Ohio D-III Wrestling Team

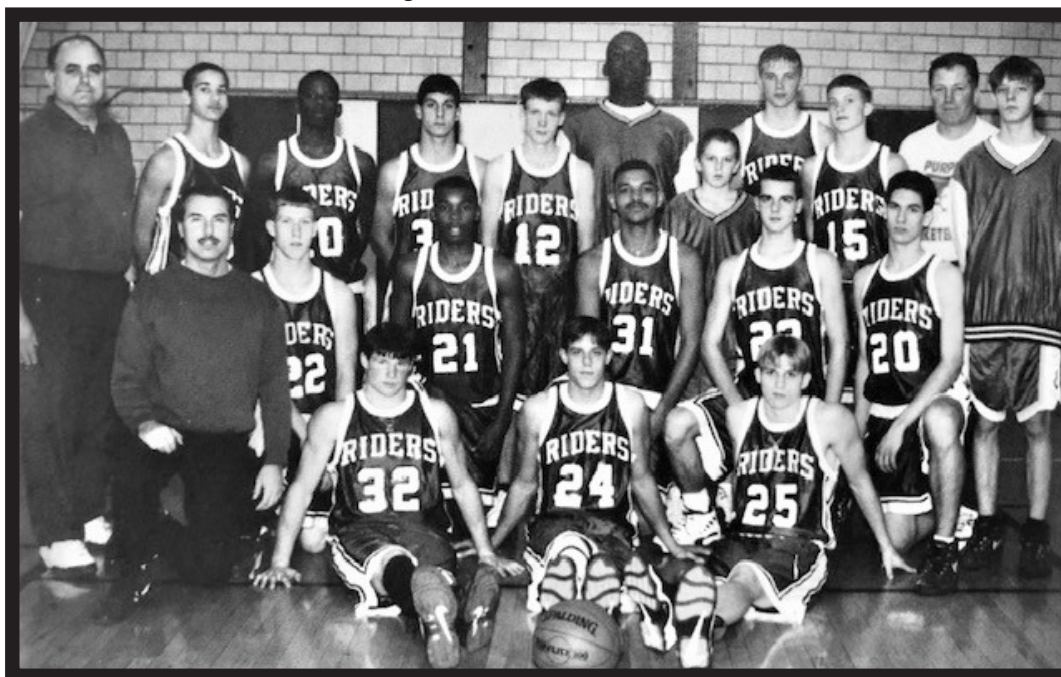


1993 Boys Cross Country Team
