- The delineation of employment skills and the development of curriculum to instill these skills.
- Changes in the economy and in the job market, and the types of employment in which future jobs are most likely to be available, and:
- Suggestions for developing a working relationship among businesses, labor organizations and education personnel.

The ESC of Northeast Ohio's Business Advisory Council (BAC) is one of the largest of its kind in the state of Ohio, with over 40 aligned school districts, 100+ partnering businesses and community agencies, spanning Cuyahoga, Geauga, Lake, Portage, and Summit Counties.

Alliance for Working Together

The Alliance for Working Together (AWT) was started in 2002 as a small, informal group of manufacturers, who met to discuss topics of interest and best practices among local manufacturers. Finding skilled workers was quickly identified as one of the top challenges for manufacturers. Promoting rewarding careers in manufacturing became their core mission. In 2012, the AWT Foundation became a 501(c)3 non-profit. The AWT Foundation now has 500+ manufacturing companies, community organizations, and school members.

With the help of our strategic partners, the AWT Foundation has developed several Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM)-to-career educational programs. They have placed more than 1,000+ students into manufacturing careers

and helped over 300 5th and 6th grade students learn about and experience manufacturing careers in local communities. AWT has facilitated over 1,200 student, teacher, and parent tours of manufacturing facilities. It has been instrumental in access to transportation for manufacturing employees and providing Department of Labor and Ohio Department of Iob & Family Services (ODIFS) recognized pre-apprenticeship and apprenticeship programs for manufacturing occupations including Tool & Die Maker, Mold Maker, Precision Machinist, and Tool Programmer/Numerical Control.

AWT is the bridge between the manufacturing industry, local, state, and federal governments, K-12, career and technical education systems, and post-secondary institutions, both public and private.

In 2023, AWT introduced WorkAdvance through funding under the EDA Good Jobs Challenge Grant. This entry-level two-week boot camp-style program provides a pathway to a career in manufacturing regardless of the participant's current experience level. This hands-on interactive program covers blueprint reading, shop math, metrics and measurement, resume building, interview prep, and financial literacy. Learn more at AWTWorkAdvance.com.
