9:00 - 9:15 am: Welcome and Introductions Around the Room -

- ECOESC Career Navigators, Dirk DeCoy & Mark Cook
- Belmont-Harrison Career Center, Richard Schoene
- Rich Shoene: described the CTE programs and locations throughout Belmont County. This includes middle school and high school students. They touch over 1,000 kids in our area.
- They are planning to add Emergency Medical Tech & PLTW
- They employ a full time work based learning coordinator who works with WBL, tours, driver's ed, and more
- They started a Sophomore CBI program for at-risk students which introduces students to WBL earlier. This offers those students the opportunity to gain more WBL experiences and program options.
- They saw value in the YOuScience after using it this year with select students. They made the decision to pick up the cost for all of their partner schools to get all of their 9th grade students registered.
- They have a school based health clinic on site. This is open to both students and their families.
- Over the summer, they will complete phase 2 to get new ductwork, ceilings, and LED lighting
- They are working with the Safety grants in order to make the school safer. They have added window films, cameras, and door locks.

#### 9:15 - 9:25 am: CCMEP Update - Mark Cook & Dirk DeCoy

- Work with students 14-24 years old. They work with these students to train them in many ways to prepare for the workforce. Teaching soft skills.
- They create pathways for students to obtain the things they need to get out into the workforce
- They receive financial incentives depending on what they complete, including, but not limited to, maintaining a job, good grades, obtaining a drivers license, etc.

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They target 8th grade students to help them overcome obstacles to career preparation

- All CCMEP students must have a specific need in order to apply and be accepted into the program.
- They serve 12 different school districts/ Career centers
- There are annual objectives for each year while working with the students. This helps students recognize wins and obstacles they need help with to overcome.
- They use a variety of activities to increase knowledge and practice to be career ready throughout their entire high school career.
- They provided information to get more information and sign up.
- The process to get a student in the program includes: apply for the services, they are assigned a case manager, evaluate eligibility, then they are assigned to Mark or Dirk to complete activities.
- This is a long-term program that doesn't stop with getting their driver's license. Services are provided until the student is on their own working.
- There are summer employment opportunities for students.
- The program has gone from 10 students to 72 students. They have had significant wins over the past few years.
- Work opportunities have to follow minor labor laws. Minors require direct supervision.

- Project Best is a non profit organization that promotes local trades and local craftsmen. They get out to school to teach them about careers, safety, training, and how to get started.
- They host a lot of trade shows to share information about careers in the trades.

- Their CCP numbers have drastically increased
- They have also hired two career pathway specialists to help CCP students as they navigate their start to their careers

- She presented on the IT Pre-Apprenticeship option through Franklin University. They are able to earn CompTIA credentials. They can go either in Cyber Security or Information Technology.
- *All courses are online and the testing voucher is included in the price.*
- The courses do stack for each program. They both equal about 100 hrs. They end with a credentialing test.
- Franklin will give the student College credit to students that earn the credential.
- They can do it as a credential, a pre-apprenticeship, or a CCP class
