Linear equations and systems, quantitative literacy and manipulation of complex equations are tested in this section

READING

52 multiple choice questions based on lengthy reading passages in 65 minutes

Passages from a work of literature, social science, science, and a U.S. founding document or "the great global conversation"

Understanding words in context and analysis of ideas are tested in this section

WRITTING &

LANGUAGE

44 multiple choice questions based on lengthy reading passage that are similar to the reading section in 25 minutes

Standard English conventions and expression of ideas are tested in this section.

Think of yourself as an editor tasked with improving someone else's writing No explicit science section

The Reading section incorporates tables, graphs and charts, but no specific scientific knowledge is required

What You Need To Know About The ACT & SAT

SCORING



Test Information Release (TIR) available for December, April and June test dates. This will give you the chance to see your actual test with correct answers and is a vital tool to effectively prepare for your next test.

4 free score reports. Other score reports are \$12 each

Scores are available 2-8 weeks after the test date

Test dates in: February, April, June, July, September, October, December. Note: No test centers in New York state for the February and July dates. No test centers in California for the July date.

TASSASS

40 minutes

The essay asks you to develop a perspective on an issue and analyze the relationship between your perspective and one or more alternatives

Essay section scores range between 0-12

Students only receive points for correct answers, so there is no "guessing penalty"

Each section receives a score between 1–36. The four scores are averaged to produce a composite score which is rounded up if necessary. "Superscore" refers to when admissions offices will take the best scores on different sections across multiple test dates to give the student their highest possible score.

SUPERSCORES

This rarely happens with the ACT, but colleges and universities will notice if you improve from test to test. \$46.00 without writing; \$62.50 with writing

Question and Answer Service (QAS) available for October, March and May test dates. This will give you the chance to see your actual test with correct answers and is a vital tool to effectively prepare for your next test.

4 free score reports (8 if fee waiver). Other score reports are \$12 each

Scores are available 4-5 weeks after the test date

Test dates in: March, May, June, August, October, November, December.

BESEVER

The essay asks you to read a lengthy passage and use evidence from the passage to explain how the author built an argument to persuade an audience. You do not need to make your own persuasive argument.

Essay section scores range between 6–24

SCORING

Students only receive points for correct answers, so there is no "guessing penalty"

Each section receives a score between 10-40. Evidence-Based Reading & Writing section scores are added and multiplied by 10; Math section score is multiplied by 20; both sections added for total score between 400-1600.
